



Where are Department of Defense Tuition Assistance Dollars Going?





 Six for-profit education companies collect 41 percent of all DOD Tuition Assistance funds.







For-Profit Colleges Collect Nearly Two-Thirds of DOD Military Spouse Education Benefits











SUBJECT: Possible Opportunities for EDMC "90:10"

Thanks for the call outlining the interest of EDMC in learning more about potential areas of funding that could add students and revenue that would also address the "90:10" issue.

In light of that dual set of interests, let us briefly review the opportunities we see among recurring sources of government funding, plus some other prospects to consider.

THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT

There are a number of emerging opportunities that may present short, medium, and longer-term opportunities that should also be carefully considered, given their size and scale.

The Military

Military Spouses. Probably one of the most important potential short and long-term targets for EDMC are the 800,000-plus military spouses who have been authorized, for the first time in history, for a one-time entitlement of up to \$6,000 that can be used for training, as well as for counseling and other ways to assist them in finding work. We are told by the DOD that the largest demand among the spouses is for healthcare-related training, although it can also cover almost all other occupational areas.
